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1. Overview

The purpose of this form

- 1.1 You should complete this form if you are applying for a licence to provide a small-scale radio multiplex service (a ‘small-scale radio multiplex licence’). A small-scale radio multiplex service is the means by which DAB digital radio stations (‘digital sound programme services’) are broadcast, and can transmit around ten stereo digital sound programme services (or a significantly higher number if the DAB+ standard is utilised). The application form is divided into two parts – **Part A** (which we will publish on our website) and **Part B** (which will be kept confidential). This document constitutes Part A; [Part B of the application form](#) is available separately.
- 1.2 Small-scale radio multiplex licences are awarded by Ofcom in a competitive process. Applications are judged against specified criteria, and Ofcom awards the licence to the applicant which it considers best meets the criteria.

As Ofcom is already aware, this newly advertised two county coverage area was originally proposed by GTFM when it applied to serve only this part of the much larger South Wales Valleys polygon originally advertised in Round 1 in 2020. Although this application was successful, because of the devastating effect of the Covid pandemic it wasn't possible to raise enough capital to launch the proposed service within the statutory 18 month limit.

Our proposed coverage area for this multiplex is therefore largely the same as the advertised licence area, comprising the vast majority of the relatively compact County of Merthyr Tydfil which has a population of around 65,000 and its much larger adjoining neighbour Rhondda Cynon Taf County Borough (abbreviated as RCT) which is an amalgamation of three previously separate river valley communities containing around a quarter of a million inhabitants, around a quarter of whom live in the two principle towns Pontypridd (Taff valley) and Aberdare (Cynon valley) each with around 33,000 residents, plus dozens of smaller towns, most of them former mining communities laid out in ribbon developments along the rest of the Taff, Cynon and the two Rhondda river valleys which are separated from each other by high ridges.

In RCT the proposed DAB footprint replicates the combined FM coverage areas of community stations GTFM and Rhondda Radio, both of which its anticipated will be carried on the new multiplex. While 21 year old GTFM presently covers the lower half of the main Rhondda (Fawre) valley plus virtually all of the Taff valley area within RCT (including Pontypridd) and the Cynon Valley (including Aberdare), five year old Rhondda Radio concentrates on serving the two Rhondda Valleys, especially their 'upper' extremities which are largely not covered on FM by GTFM. Our DAB coverage will also embrace the northern boundary of RCT county borough not served by either community station on FM via an additional TX site at Hirwaun.

We are also including the adjacent Merthyr County (in the upper Taff valley) in our DAB footprint because it is socially connected to RCT and would not be likely otherwise to enjoy a wide a range of DAB services compared with residents nearer the South Wales coast - and so it can have its own local radio service, which it has not benefitted from since commercial station Valleys Radio closed down in 2009, although parts of the area do now enjoy some overspill FM reception from GTFM's 3 nearby transmitters.

To this end we have been working for several years with a local radio group called Merthyr Radio which intends to launch a community radio service on our new DAB multiplex, hopefully from the outset as it already has studio premises.*

**Merthyr Radio was previously awarded an FM Community Radio Licence which was not activated by Ofcom after the group's financial backers unexpectedly decided not to go ahead but only informed Ofcom of that decision. Ofcom therefore assumed they were handing back the licence offer and closed the file. In reality however, the rest of the*

Merthyr Radio applicant group including founding chairman Councillor Lee Davies and partners GTFM were not aware of the financiers decision or their direct contact with Ofcom until it was 'too late'. This was particularly unfortunate as there was an alternative funder available to help launch the radio station at the time. Since then Cllr Davies has also won £1.3 million of UK Government 'Levelling Up' funding for a successful creative industries community project in the Merthyr area.

As Ofcom now understands the circumstances behind the apparent FM licence hand back, Merthyr Radio may attempt to persuade it to re-activate it's FM licence as it is still in a position to provide the local radio service exactly as originally described in its application. If this proves possible it will enable a fuller local service to be mounted for Merthyr at the outset on DAB with FM support because digital take-up in this area lags behind that in the coastal cities so a DAB only station would have more limited resources in its early years.

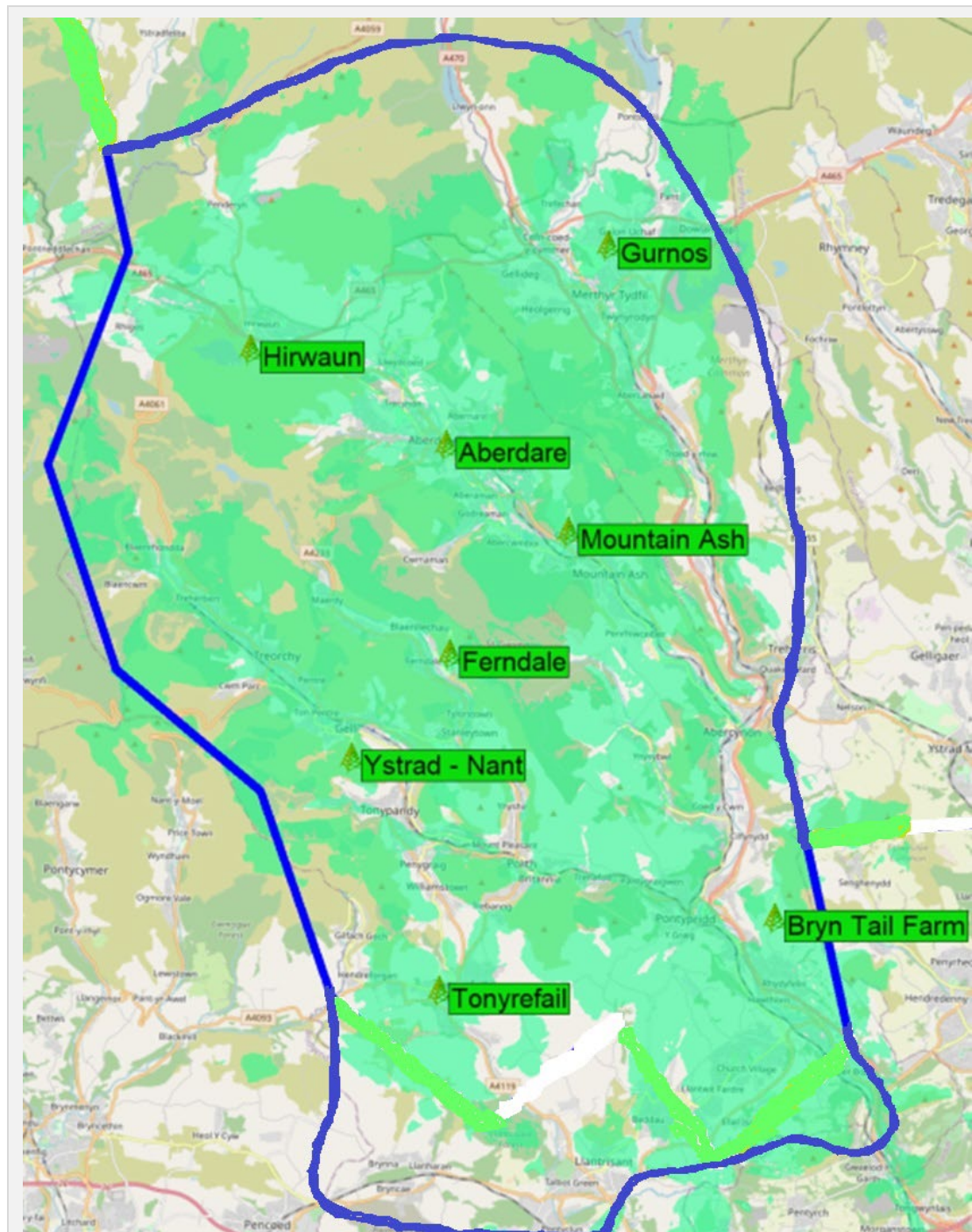

It has been suggested coverage of the two Rhondda Valleys might be more efficiently achieved with one centrally located transmitter instead of the two originally planned which would also usefully reduce the transmitter total to 7 and save around £9,000 in infrastructure outlay plus ongoing operating costs. However, while a coverage plot from a high spot in Penrhys lit up a lot of hillsides it left the valley floors with insufficient signal strength by comparison with the two-site solution, so we'll stick with that for now. However if we do manage to find a suitable central location (which seems to fit Ofcom guidance about outgoing interference) we may approach you at a later stage for your views on an alternative approach, but only in the Rhondda valleys.

- 3.17 Please provide a high-level estimate of the costs you believe will be required to establish the multiplex service.

As eight transmitter sites will be needed we estimate the unusually high **capital cost of constructing such a network estimated at around £72,000 (= 8 x £9,000 per site)** could not be sustained on a commercially viable basis from the revenue likely to be generated from the rental of multiplex capacity to radio stations paying to access a population limited to around 200,000.

We therefore plan to finance our 'Valleys DAB' SSDAB+ transmitter infrastructure with grant funding in order to establish its community ownership on a not-for-profit basis, to be operated by GTFM on behalf of itself, Rhondda Radio, the embryonic Merthyr Radio and any other local community services which may emerge.

To this end we've had constructive talks and guidance from the National Lottery since 2020 with a view to them paying for the establishment of the whole transmitter multiplex, primarily to allow the areas community stations to migrate to digital radio in order to preserve the sustainability of our socially valuable community services in the longer term.

We also have a very good working relationship with the PyC Wind Farm Community Fund which distributes £1-2m a year to community organisations in the upper halves of the Rhondda and Cynon (and three other) valleys and have already financed the construction of Rhondda Radio's two FM transmitters and GTFM's FM relays in Aberdare and Mountain Ash, which came on the air in 2021. As well as the potential to provide further support for the area's community stations to transition to DAB, PyC is also excited by the prospect our multiplex will greatly increase the number of digital stations available to residents in this mountainous area where some national DAB operators may never be able to afford enough relays to ensure consistent reception given the size of the target population. PyC grants could in practice cover the costs of up to five of our DAB transmitters which lie in their funding area if National Lottery funding is unavailable. In that eventuality we now know enough smaller scale grant funders to be able to pay for the remaining transmitters, on an individual basis if needs be.

Among the **ongoing running costs** GTFM will shoulder, expected to total between £12-15,000 per annum, are programming circuit rental, (estimated at around £3,800 per annum), transmitter site rental at sites where its applicable and overall administration costs. This will be paid-for from the income generated by selling remaining DSP capacity on the multiplex which could eventually total £25,000 per annum but is likely to be far lower at the outset.

To keep establishment and running costs as low as possible we plan to co-locate up to six transmitters at existing or planned community radio FM transmitter sites, plus Merthyr and a DAB only site at Hirwaun. This will be located at a mobile phone mast identified by our technical partner UK DAB Networks Ltd at Hirwaun Rugby Football Club, north of Aberdare

While the mast infrastructure of the main site at Pontypridd is owned by GTFM, three of the other sites are owned by community organisations mostly operating on a not-for-profit basis to whom we reimburse our electricity usage, plus up to three owned by the local authority which has so far not charged rent because we are a not-for-profit organisation delivering social gain. Clearly these relationships may need to adapt a little over time when the multiplex becomes profitable so that host organisations share the benefit.

Meanwhile establishment of the multiplex, including its technical start-up and liaison with C-DSPs and DSPs will be carried out by UK DAB Networks.

Multiplexing software will be sourced from leading multiplex software firm Factum Radioscape, a majority Nation Broadcasting owned company.

Nation Broadcasting is a minority shareholder in UK DAB Networks Ltd and as the UK's third largest operator of local commercial radio licences has interests in a number of local DAB multiplexes across the UK. It has considerable DAB launch and operating experience, including in SSDAB, having owned and operated the Glasgow trial multiplex since 2018. Nation also has interests in adjacent DAB areas in South Wales.

Their collective experience brings with it full knowledge of the costs and risks associated with the launch and operation of our proposed multiplex. In addition we are being offered access to Nation Broadcasting's credit and finance facilities which can provide back-office functions and if needs-be additional finance through UK DAB Networks Ltd. This will free-up GTFM management time to focus on providing an excellent service to our multiplex service providers and listeners.

Ongoing Network Operations and maintenance costs will be covered through an arrangement with UK DAB Networks Ltd, an established consultancy and DAB operations company owned by Ash Elford. Ash has established an enviable reputation as one of the pioneers of SSDAB. He will be responsible for the day-to-day technical management of the multiplex and will advise on strategy. He has established UK DAB Networks Ltd to provide an effective management and ownership platform for SSDAB operations. In return, UK DAB Network/Nation will be given access to up to five DSP programme channels on the multiplex.

Carriage fees for the remaining digital channels on the multiplex will then be used to pay GTFM's ongoing costs to manage the operation of the multiplex and it is anticipated that once the majority of the commercial slots on the multiplex are filled, a small operating surplus will be generated which can then be reinvested in the provision of community radio in the area.

For example we are receiving helpful guidance from the National Lottery on how to present our bid to them and are busy gathering the evidence they've requested from local community organisations as to the usefulness of GTFM in communicating their messages to the public, which we are pleased to report are very positive.

Through our partnership with UK DAB Networks Ltd we have access to individuals with significant DAB experience and this expertise will ensure a smooth, professional launch and successful ongoing operation of the multiplex.

Day-to-day technical management of the multiplex will be by Ash Elford, owner of UK DAB Networks Ltd, a new DAB multiplex consultancy, ownership and operating company.

Ash is one of the UK's SSDAB pioneers who has overseen the establishment and successful operation of the Portsmouth SSDAB trial. He has also worked with Nation Broadcasting for a number of years and has overseen a significant improvement in the reliability, coverage and services available on the SSDAB Glasgow trial multiplex. Previously Ash was part of the DAB digital radio team at Arqiva.

Ideally we'd like to start broadcasting to main RCT County Borough communities by the start of August 2024 to allow GTFM to mount additional coverage of the one-week National Eisteddfod which is visiting the county borough for the first time in decades during the second week of that month. In practice that would ideally require six of our transmitters to start broadcasting at the same time.

So if it's not possible to get all 8 transmitters on-air by then we would look to add the Hirwaun and Merthyr ones as soon as possible afterwards as they serve areas where our community radio stations are not properly audible on FM at present and Merthyr Radio may also need a longer lead time as they hope to launch at the same time as the multiplex transmitter serving their town.

In practice this would probably mean getting the bulk of the multiplex on air less than a year after the outcome of this application is known, which could be challenging given the complexity of the multiplex. But at the time of writing that is our target.

Initially GTFM discovered on behalf of itself and other potential C-DSP community radio participants as much as possible about experience gained by participants during the SSDAB trials and how the system works in practice by speaking to participants, plus desk research and by attending seminars organised by the Community Media Association and Ofcom.

Through our local knowledge of providing FM coverage in this notoriously difficult Welsh Valleys area where far more transmitters than 'usual' are required, we have devised a not-for-profit grant supported business model to ensure we can establish the transmitter network, which will then be sustained from income generated by the sale of DSP capacity on the multiplex. This will facilitate capacity for C-DSP service providers at minimum cost to make best use of reserved capacity and we have already secured firm interest in three of the four channels available.

At the same time our technical partners UK DAB Networks have pursued other SSDAB licence areas too and with partners Nation Broadcasting have stimulated interest from broadcasters.

Going forward, in respect of commercial services, as a minimum, we will also:

- Provide a website and social media invitations seeking interested broadcasters to contact us
- Publish a ratecard for multiplex capacity
- Work to ensure that multiplex is as fully utilised as possible
- Allocate capacity in a way that promotes the greatest diversity of formats and providers in the event of demand for multiplex capacity exceeding supply.
